Message: "Co-sponsor HR-1179 Respect for Rights of Conscience Act."

Background: The U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB) has renewed its call in support of the Rights of Conscience Act, H. R. 1179.

On July 19, the Institute of Medicine submitted its recommendations to the Department of Health and Human Services on the mandated "preventive services" for women under the new health care law, the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act (PPACA). The list of "essential health benefits" and a separate list of mandated "preventive services for women" may be used to require almost all private health plans to cover various procedures rejected by Catholic teaching, such as abortifacients, contraception, sterilization, in vitro fertilization, and treatments using material from deliberately killed unborn children.

Speaking for the Catholic bishops, Cardinal DiNardo objected to the report's mandated coverage of surgical sterilization and of "all FDA-approved birth control (including the IUD, 'morning-after' pills, and the abortion-inducing drug Ella)" and of "education and counseling" to promote these among all "women of reproductive capacity."

If HHS accepts these recommendations, all insurance plans will be required to cover these controversial practices without a co-pay from recipients. DiNardo said, "The considerable cost of these practices will be paid by all who participate in health coverage. . . . [S]uch a mandate would require all . . . to carry health coverage that violates the deeply-held moral and religious convictions of many."
